What does an ironworker do?

- ◆ Erection of structural steel
- ◆ Placement of reinforcing bars in concrete construction
- ◆ Rigging and erection of equipment
- ◆ Installation of miscellaneous fabricated building components
- ◆ Welding fabrication, ornamental, aluminum, sash, bronze and plastic materials
- ◆ Work with metal close to tolerances
- ◆ Machinery moving

Where do ironworkers work?

- ◆ Bridges
- ◆ Industrial and commercial buildings
- ◆ Sports stadiums
- ◆ Large residential buildings

Am I qualified?

- ◆ Must be 18 years of age
- ◆ Must have a high school diploma or GED
- ◆ Be willing to work in the heat of the summer and cold of the winter.
- ◆ Must be in good physical condition to perform the work required
- ◆ Must have a sincere interest in the trade

What can I expect while training?

- ◆ Program is approximately 4 years
- ◆ You must attend night school
- ◆ On-the-job training with experienced ironworkers
- ◆ Some travel may be required

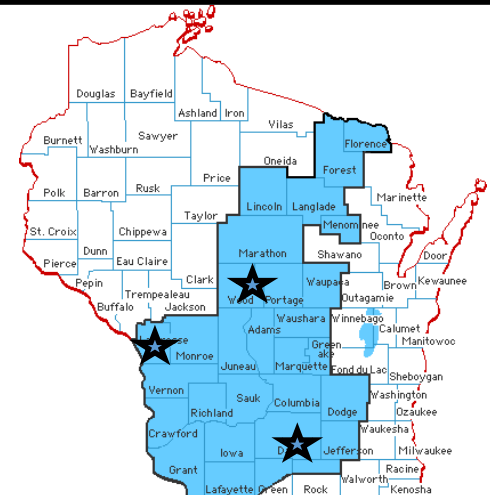

Apprenticeship is a structured system of training designed to prepare individuals for skilled occupations. It combines on-the-job learning under the supervision of experienced journey workers with related classroom instruction. It is sponsored by employers, employer associations, or labor/management groups that can hire and train in a working situation.

The employment opportunity is the most basic requirement for an apprenticeship. Without a job there is no "on-the-job" learning, and such training represents about 90% of the program. Apprentices who successfully complete the prescribed number of training hours in an apprenticeship program become certified skilled workers.

Ironworker

Raise, place, and unite iron or steel girders, columns, and other structural members to form completed structures or structural frameworks. May erect metal storage tanks and assemble prefabricated metal buildings.
