

MADISON <> Work in the Madison area is booming! 

New Apprentices: Pay close attention! Completion of Work Reports

The top portion of the work report must be completed in full (Name, Date, Member#, Employer, etc.) The work report must be received in the Apprenticeship office no later than the 10th of the month following the "work report month." For example, the November 2025 report is due no later than December 10th, 2025. The hours must be completed on the form with a breakdown, for example, of REBAR, POST TENSION, STRUCTURAL, SCHOOL, etc. The form must also be signed by both the Foreman and the Apprentice. Please be advised: Once you turn your work report in, there will be NO adjustments made to that report for missed or forgotten hours of work or school. Therefore, be sure your report is COMPLETE and ACCURATE before you submit it to the Apprenticeship Office.

Training Center Food and Alcohol Policy - recent problems/issues at Local 383 Training Center.

<u>Your Attention Please</u>: It has come to my attention that compliance with the rule for food and drink (including alcohol) has been slipping more and more in recent months at the Training Center. If adherence to the policy (see below for the full text) continues to decline, the solution incorporated in the policy when it was established (boldfaced and underlined below) WILL BE implemented. In addition, violators of the alcohol policy will be brought before the Joint Apprenticeship Committee for discipline and very likely expulsion from the Apprenticeship Program.

"On May 24th, 2022, at the monthly Joint Apprenticeship Committee Meeting for Local 383's Apprenticeship Program, the Committee unanimously agreed that effective June 1st 2022, Local 383's Training Center and the property on which it sits would be <u>strictly alcohol-free</u> during any Apprenticeship Program activities. This includes time on-site pre and post all classes/training. This does NOT include any Local 383 officially sponsored social events. <u>Violators of this policy will be ushered off-site and may face disciplinary hearings and action from the Joint Apprenticeship Committee.</u>

In addition to this policy, all classrooms and shop areas within the Training Center are now designated non-dining, non-eating areas, with the exception of the break tables and refrigerator/microwave area on the west side of the Training Center Shop. **Violation of this policy will result in the removal of the break area from the shop**. Food and non-alcoholic beverages may of course be consumed outside and within personal vehicles.

These changes were necessary to maintain the integrity and discipline of the Apprenticeship Program, and to protect the members, the facility and the grounds from physical and legal liability. Adherence to this policy is expected and very much appreciated."


