AREA WORK REPORTS



MADISON <> Work is very good in the Madison area. We have 6 members on the out of work list. Findorff has ironworkers at Epic, Deforest high school, Hangar 441 in Truax, Element Labs, Mendota Correctional, Exact Science, CUNA, F-35 Simulator in Truax, Middleton school and Sun Prairie school. Boldt has the structural in Brownsville and the miscellaneous at Alter Metals. CD Smith has the structural, rods, PT and precast at Madison Yards; the structural rods, PT and miscellaneous at the Continental; and the rods on a steam tunnel by Sellery Hall. Miron has the structural and rods at the Dane County Airport and the structural and miscellaneous at UW Chemistry and Mauston school. JP Cullen has the structural and precast at Camp Randall, the miscellaneous at UW Natatorium, a metal building at Epic and a metal building and precast plank at Chocolate Factory in Milton. Aurora Erectors has the rods and PT at The Standard on East Washington Avenue. Chilstrom has the rods and PT at Oakwood Village and the rods at the F-35 Simulator, Camp Randall and Truax. MKE has the rods at UW Veterinary School, Bayview Apartments, McFarland public works and on the beltline. AWS has the curtain wall at CUNA. Quick Fab has the structural at a church in Fort Atkinson. CS&E has the structural on two buildings at Park 151 in Sun Prairie. Capital Steel has the structural at Chase Bank in Hilldale, VA Hospital, Millpore Sigma at Research Park; the rods at Wilson Street apartments and the miscellaneous at 500 West Washington Avenue. Selden Steel has the structural at Wyoming 1 in McFarland, Elm Street plaza in the Dells and Holiday Inn in Sauk and some miscellaneous on Park Street for Krupp. Badgerland Erectors has the structural, rods, and a metal building at Octopi; the structural and rods at Pepsi in Windsor; the structural at Amara in Hilldale and Corey Frank in Deforest; some structural beef up at Brothers Main; rods at Grey Wolf; metal buildings at LM Corrugated in Platteville and the Chocolate Shoppe in Madison; and the miscellaneous at 512 Williamson Street and the Dane County Emergency Management.

LaCROSSE <> Work in the LaCrosse area has been a little slow to start out the new year with 4 members currently on the out of work list. CD Smith has ongoing rods at the WWTP in LaCrosse. Carey Specialized Services has ongoing miscellaneous at the UW-L Fieldhouse, structural and miscellaneous at the Kwik Trip daycare remodel, and miscellaneous at Harter's Recycling in Onalaska. Fowler & Hammer has ongoing rebar at the Fort McCoy WWTP, miscellaneous at Gunderson in downtown LaCrosse, Landmark by the Rivers, and structural and miscellaneous at Trane Plant 5 in LaCrosse. Modern Crane has the structural/precast at the Kwik Trip Bakery in Onalaska, structural at the Hy-Vee in Onalaska, structural at the LaCrosse fire station, structural at Crossing Medical in Prairie du Chein, structural at Mile Bluff Medical Center in Mauston, structural/miscellaneous at Pepsi in LaCrosse, structural/precast at WTC Diesel Shop in Onalaska, miscellaneous at Fort McCoy WWTP and structural/precast at Kwik Trip stores statewide. Mayo Hospital is scheduled to start digging this month. It will be a six story structure in LaCrosse. So, the LaCrosse area will be looking good through the summer.

NORTH <> As of early April we have 11 members off - a little slow right now but we have a lot of work coming. Boldt has a few jobs going, but they picked up the big McCain Foods job in Plover which is \$167 million and should break ground soon. There are 4 gas boilers going in Weston 3 & 4 this year. The pre-job is April 14th. That job is \$165 million with a lot of ironwork in it. Findorff is starting to pick up more work up north with 2-3 jobs going right now and a few more starting as the year goes. They should be busy for a while up north. CR Meyer just started a 10 month project at the Waupaca Foundry and should keep 8-12 ironworkers busy all year. We are always looking for new members with or without experience. If you know of anyone that would make a good #383 member, send them our way. Miron has a few jobs at the Marshfield clinics in the area and a pretty big job at Marshfield utilities starting in July. MSHA Refresher is June 25th at 8am at the Rapids hall. Come get your \$150 for your cert. Overall, a little slow right now but the next 12-18 months look great. Stay up on your certs and be safe. There will be a Pension/SMA Retirement class on July 9th at the Madison Hall & Training Center. It is a great way to learn more about your retirement. If you are young or close to retiring - might be something you want to check out.

New Apprentices: Pay close attention! Completion of Work Reports

The top portion of the work report must be completed in full (Name, Date, Member#, Employer, etc.) The work report must be received in the Apprenticeship office no later than the 10th of the month following completion of that month. For example, the April 2020 report is due no later than May 10th, 2020. The hours must be completed on the form with a breakdown, for example, of REBAR, POST TENSION, STRUCTURAL, SCHOOL, etc. The form must also be signed by the Foreman and the Apprentice.

Late Work Reports, and what it COSTS YOU:

Monthly reports of work and school hours are required paperwork for apprentices in the Ironworking Apprenticeship program of Local 383. The State of WI Department of Workforce Development-Bureau of Apprenticeship Standards and the Madison-Area Ironworking Joint Apprenticeship Committee REQUIRE them to be submitted monthly, per State Standards and the Local Committee's Policy Statement. Why should you care? Because the work report is the record that is the basis for your completion of the program, and the record that determines when you get PAY INCREASES. Work reports are due on the 10th day of the month following the month of the work report. For every day late, your raises may be held for one day. So what happens if you are, say, three months late? Well, that would total 30 days, plus 60 days, plus 90 days....180 days late. If you were right at the hours mark for your next raise (which are typically 5% increases) that would short you roughly \$1,965.60 of pay you WOULD have had if your reports were on time. Now, if you were also getting to the end of a semester, and were looking to get reimbursed for tuition for your classes (which currently stands at around \$630.00 per semester) you could also lose that for being behind on work reports. That would be a nice chunk of money totaling about \$2595.60. Why hurt yourself and your family? For about 5-10 minutes a month, you can pay yourself thousands of dollars over the course of your apprenticeship program. Think about what you do every day NOW for money...you work at a hard, dangerous job, outside in the heat and the cold, getting yelled at, getting cut up, bruised, burnt, sore, and tired, for \$22.65/hour at the start of your program. Would you spend a few minutes each month writing numbers down to avoid losing hundreds, or even thousands of dollars? Think about it...



NEXT YEAR we will be celebrating the 100th Year Anniversary of Local 383. We are planning a once in a lifetime celebration to include a **banquet** and **commemorative book**.
